WATCHING THE Sky In 2017

A BEGINNERS FIELD GUIDE TO SKYWATCHING



One of the most enjoyable aspects of Ufology is actually getting outdoors and attempting to observe the phenomenon with your own eyes. These days a lot of people involved in the field of Ufology prefer to concentrate on the conspiracies surrounding the phenomenon rather than the actual phenomenon itself, which is quite sad considering the technological developments that have been made in photographic equipment such as infrared and thermal cameras.

Despite most UFO sightings being extremely rare, there is a good chance that with patience, time and practice, you too may be able to witness the phenomenon with your own eyes and perhaps even capture it on film.

Firstly, the most important thing to do is to not expect UFOs to come just



When watching the sky during the daytime it helps to have a few clouds around which also makes it a lot easier to spot as well as to film anything unusual. When looking for objects it helps to follow the edges of clouds especially zoomed in with a quality camera. Nowadays 4K cameras are dropping in price dramatically and are presently the standard in quality in capturing UFOs/UAP activity.

Most digital night vision monoculars can be used to film during the daytime as well as night-time. Night vision units with a built in SD card recording function are very handy when looking for activity, as most sightings are very short by nature and messing around with attached cables and computers could mean that you miss recording the sighting.

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Night-time sky watching can sometimes be confusing especially to people who are not aware of benign objects in the sky such as satellites, or flares that come from iridium satellites. Many have confused an iridium flare as a genuine UFO so it helps when beginning to download an app such as 'Satellite Safari' which will show you what is what.

Planes at a distance, especially when heading directly towards a person can appear like stationary lights so an app such as 'Flight Radar 24' can be very handy in these situations.

The future of UFO spotting seems to be very bright as camera technology has progressed to a level never seen before, and now that thermal cameras are becoming more commonplace we will begin to see more captures of 'invisible' objects in our skies in better quality than ever before. So once you are set up with your equipment, including tripods and cameras, you are ready to go outside and begin filming. You are bound to make a mistake or a misidentification when sky watching day or night but don't let that put you off. In science and field research, mistakes are made all the time. As the old saying goes;

because you want them to. Spending time outdoors does not automatically mean that they will show up to put a show on for you, so if you do not witness anything straight away then keep on persevering until you do.

These days people can try mixing in meditation as well as CE-5 protocols into their sky watching to attempt to 'vector' in UFOs, however this does not work with everyone as the phenomenon seems subjective to certain individuals, you need to find what works for you.

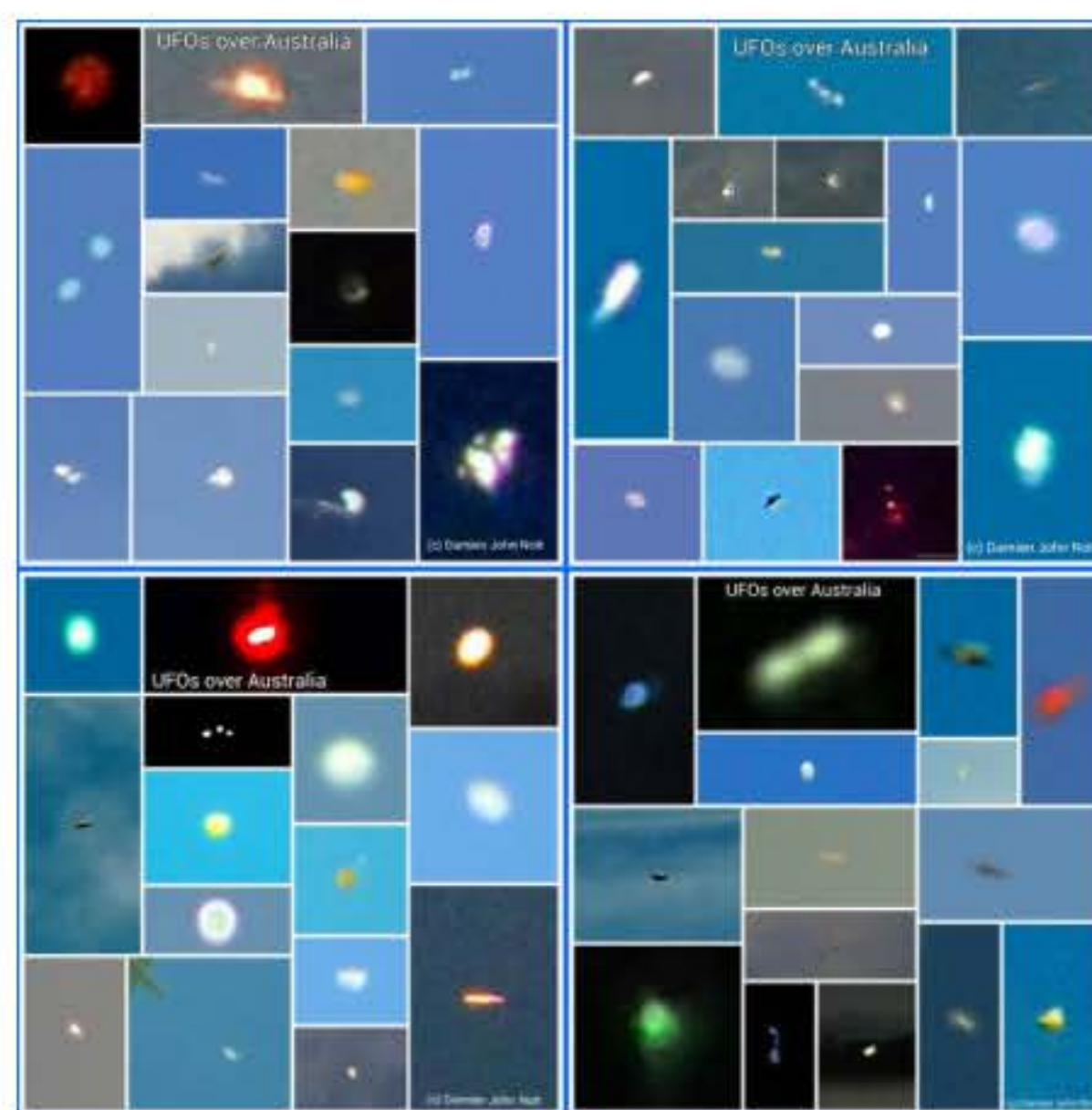


There are many aspects involved in sky watching and filming the UFO phenomenon, which due to the length of this article I can only touch upon.

Even though UFOs can be spotted anywhere around the world, they do tend to frequent certain locations at certain times so finding the right place for you is very important. From experience I have found that certain areas such as remote country towns as well as areas that have high quantities in crystal quartz veins seem to have a bit more activity than other areas.

Once you have found a place that suits you, comfort is of extreme importance, since you will be looking up at the sky for some time. Many

When watching the sky during the daytime it is important to sit in an area with shade and out of the direct sunlight. This is important for a couple of reasons, firstly; the Sun can easily damage your eyes and secondly it will make it easier to spot unusual objects because of the reduced glare in the sky.



During a daytime sky watch it helps to know about the wind conditions and direction, as well as the types of clouds around on the day. This is important because if you do see or capture something that is going

prefer to sit in portable chairs but the best position is to lie on one's back either on a fold-out banana lounge or straight on the ground. This will give you a great and steady view of the sky without risking a sore neck the following morning. Daytime and nighttime sky watching can be two totally different experiences and both have their pro's and cons associated.

against the wind then it may be something unusual. Clouds can also work as a rough type of ruler to help determine an approximate height of an object. For instance, if you witness an object flying into a Stratus cloud which are above 18,00ft, you can deduce and discount other objects such as birds and insects which do not fly at that height.
